Wahig-Inabanga Watershed

SouthEast Asia Philippines

Mean annual Rainfall: ~2,000



The watershed communities are composed of native Boholanos and an indigenous tribe of the Eskaya in the upland mountains of Pilar Town. The most common agricultural produce of the communities are rice, corn, cassava, ube, vegetables and fruit trees. The land is predominantly rolling hills with a composite of parent soil materials. Among the soil parent material identified are: (i) limestone; (ii) recent alluvium; (iii) shale/sandstone and; (iv) volcanic (Figure 1).

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Wahig-Inabanga Watershed is 65,000 hectares of land area which covers a total of 16 municipalities in the island province of Bohol. Majority of the economic activities in the area is agricultural land which is supported by the largest water reservoir in the Central Visayas Region, Malinao Dam in Pilar, Bohol. The main produce are rice, root crops Agricultural development on sloping lands of the island is largely driven by the increasing population, demand for food and livelihood security.
